The theme of the 2024 WGSC conference is "Honoring Our Past, Securing Our Future: Resilience and Reclamation in


Higher Education." Here's how it's described on the conference website (consortium.gws.wisc.edu/conference/2024-conference):

As we return to our first in-person conference in three years, we celebrate the deep institutional roots of social justice-oriented scholarship, pedagogy, and community engagement on our campuses. Many of the women's, gender, LGBTQ+, and cultural programs and centers founded in the 1970s and 1980s are approaching milestone anniversaries. Despite their critical roles in interdisciplinary scholarship and community engagement, these services are now fighting for survival against budget cuts and direct political attacks. At a moment when rollbacks to affirmative action, academic freedom, reproductive justice, LGBTQ+ protections, and other human rights are overwhelming, this year's theme illuminates the long history of resistance and resilience that has always pushed against interlocking systems of power and oppression.
